This was the second year that we opted to hold a virtual race, to ensure we maximized the health and safety of the entire community. We had a dual goal of raising money for the University District Food Bank while creating a fun and family focused event. Montlake's Urban Wildlife

In the early months of the pandemic, when many people were spending their days at home, sightings of our neighborhood wildlife species soared. While most experts think that animal behavior changed less than that of their human observers, it was a great opportunity to appreciate the abundance of wildlife that we coexist with here in Montlake.

Our most abundant larger wild mammals include eastern cottontails, raccoons, and coyotes. The eastern cottontail was introduced to Washington State in the 1930s, and has thrived here in a habitat that includes an abundance of lawns and gardens, as well as plenty of cover for hiding from predators. The population has boomed in the past couple of years, perhaps in part because of our recent milder winters and pandemic-inspired gardens. It's not clear yet how they fared in the December cold snap, our longest stretch of subfreezing weather since 1998.

One beneficiary of the rabbit boom has been our urban coyote population. Coyotes are now well-established in Seattle, with numerous sightings across the city. In our neighborhood, most sightings have been in and around the arboretum and Interlaken park. Clues to identifying a coyote include its size (20-35 pounds), long tail often tipped in black, and tall and pointed ears. Our other larger local omnivore is the raccoon, a common backyard visitor that can weigh 15-40 pounds. While raccoons and coyotes will generally avoid interactions with humans, they can at times pose a threat to neighborhood outdoor pets. Recommended strategies to prevent negative interactions include avoiding deliberate or inadvertent feeding by keeping pet food inside, using garbage cans with well-secured lids, picking up fallen fruits around trees, keeping compost piles fenced in and covered, burying food added to compost, enclosing backyard chickens in secure pens, and preventing buildup of feeder food under bird feeders. Keeping smaller dogs and cats indoors, especially between dusk and dawn, is another important safety measure. An added benefit to keeping your cat indoors is protection of our backyard birds; outdoor cats kill an estimated 2.4 billion birds a year in the United States!

The Seattle Urban Carnivore Project, a joint effort of the Woodland Park Zoo and Seattle University, studies how carnivorous animals and people co-exist in Seattle's urban and suburban neighborhoods. It focuses on black bears, bobcats, cougars, coyotes, opossum, raccoons, river otters, and red fox. We can all help with this very cool study by reporting local sightings of any of these animals through the website carnivorespotter.org. Sightings in our community in the past year have included coyotes, raccoons, and river otters. This is a great opportunity to become citizen scientists and help us better understand and appreciate our Montlake neighborhood wildlife!

A Word from Montlake Elementary



Other events included the Lost and Found Fashion Show before the morning bell on February 15, and the new winter edition of the Montlake Review carried at all little libraries around the neighborhood!

The Montlake Elementary Remodel breaks ground in Summer 2023! Our much beloved and historical old building will be receiving an extensive remodel, nearly doubling the capacity of our tiny school. 
